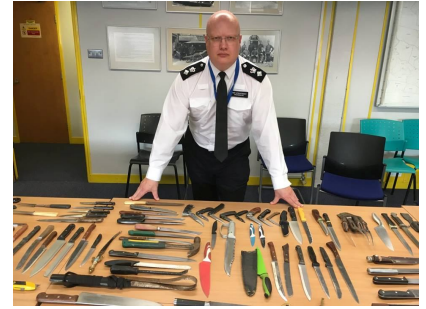
That being said, **Hillingdon Police will always remember**, and barring any major incident local police officers will be at all the main Acts of Remembrance across the borough.



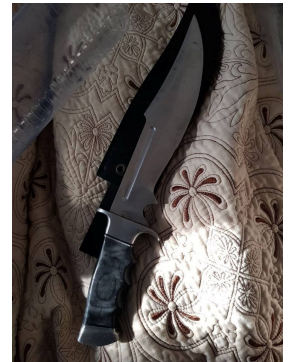
Hillingdon's Beat
